## Prepared to Pivot

For 30 years, Provide has been working to connect the dots between health and social service providers in states with the least access to abortion. Our team knows how to navigate the margins to help providers connect their clients with safe, compassionate care and support services.

To prepare for the changing legal landscape of abortion, Provide partnered with The Lawyering Project to conduct a risk analysis of our programs early in 2022. These experts found that our staff and trainees face very little risk of criminal or civil liability in conducting our programs. As a result, we were ready for the *Dobbs* decision and have never stopped providing effective trainings and technical assistance. We remain steadfast in our mission, equipping care professionals to respond to unintended pregnancy with empathy and expertise and to continue making quality abortion referrals in these uncertain times.

## Centering Race Equity in Pregnancy Options Counseling

Provide empowers health and social service providers to respond directly to client needs around unintended pregnancy and abortion. Our approach is informed by our ongoing commitment to racial equity and grounded in values of autonomy, safety, and access.

In 2022, Provide published the results of a study we conducted in partnership with Emory University with pregnant patients in the U.S. South. We found:

## Fighting Abortion Criminalization

In 2022, Provide partnered with If/When/How to develop a training for domestic violence coalitions on how self-managed abortion (SMA) intersects with their work, and how to best support their clients who are considering SMA. These trainings are crucial in helping advocates understand their mandatory reporting requirement—specifically that there is **no reason or requirement** to report any person for self-managing an abortion.

### What is medication abortion?

Medication abortion uses pills-misoprostol alone or in combination with mifepristone-to safely and effectively end a pregnancy up to 11 weeks after the first day of the person's last period. If used, mifepristone is taken first to block the hormone progesterone, which stops the pregnancy from growing. Misoprostol then causes cramping and bleeding to empty the uterus. While both regimens are recommended by the World Health Organization, misoprostol alone is likely the most common method of medication abortion used worldwide. In states where abortion is legal, these medications are frequently prescribed for abortion care; however, where and when a patient takes them depends on the state laws and clinic policies. In some states, patients can access abortion medication by mail rather than making the trip to the provider's office.

### SUPPORT DON'T REPORT.

From 2000-2020, If/WhenHow identified 61 cases of people who were criminally investigated or arrested for allegedly ending their own pregnancy or helping someone else do so. 45% were reported to law enforcement by a care provider.

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### What is Self-Managed Abortion (SMA)?

Self-managed abortion (SMA) broadly refers to abortion that happens outside of the formal healthcare system and without the involvement of a medical professional. SMA commonly happens in someone's home, safely and privately, using abortion pills (misoprostol alone or in conjunction with mifepristone) or another method (e.g., abortion massage, extraction, herbs, or other traditional methods). Abortion pills have been used successfully without a clinician by people all over the world; however, getting abortion medication online or without a prescription may have legal consequences. Provide is working to resist criminalization of abortions by educating providers against needlessly reporting their clients who they suspect of self-managing an abortion.



## Prioritizing Southern Outreach

While Provide has expanded our national footprint through virtual training, we remain heavily invested in supporting Southern states. As part of this work, in 2022 we deepened our relationships and outreach across Appalachia through these powerful collaborative initiatives:

- We partnered with the **North Carolina Association of Public Health** to train 205 participants at 43 family planning clinics on our Abortion Referrals Curriculum.
- As a recipient of the National Harm Reduction Coalition's HepConnect Grant, we developed a new training program to shift culture and behaviors at the intersections of substance use and sexual and reproductive health. In the coming months, we are working to implement this training with 200 providers across five key states: Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, and West Virginia.
- We worked with two southern abortion funds, ARC-Southeast and the Kentucky Health Justice Network (KHJN), to assess needs and provide technical assistance around training, operations, and preventing staff/volunteer burnout.
- We are partnering with the **Pacific Institute for Research and Evaluation (PIRE)** to develop and implement pregnancy options and stigma training for domestic violence, sexual assault, and substance use treatment providers in Kentucky.

# Equipping the of Providers

## Equipping the Next Generation

The future of abortion access relies in part on the next generation of health providers. To power this forward momentum, in 2022 we embarked on an exciting collaboration with Louisiana State University's Southern Center for Adolescent and Young Adult Health Equity to build a curriculum for medical students and medical residents on how to talk about abortion and pregnancy options with young people.

In deepening our work with existing providers, we are also partnering with **ExPAND Mifepristone**, a learning collaborative run by the University of Chicago Department of Family Medicine, to deliver training on pregnancy options counseling and values clarification around abortion for primary clinics in Illinois. Additionally, we developed and disseminated a new Best Practice Guide for All-Options Pregnancy Counseling to nearly 7,000 primary care providers through the **Reproductive Health Access Project.** 

## Creating Long-Term Systems Change



Through our Microgrant Project, Provide selected organizations across each of our five systems of care—domestic and sexual violence, substance use, HIV, general health care, and family planning—to learn how to integrate conversations about abortion into their client flow for long-term change. Our microgrant partners are instrumental in assessing the needs of people with lived experiences and shifting organizational culture and behaviors to better meet those needs.
